

## GOVERNOR ISSUES EXECUTIVE ORDER PERMITTING PARENTS AND KINSHIP CAREGIVERS TO DESIGNATE STANDBY GUARDIANS DURING COVID-19 CRISIS \*

Executive Order 202.14 Dated April 7, 2020

Modifies Surrogate's Court Procedure Act § 1726 (the Standby Guardian Statute) by permitting designations related to Covid-19:

The order states "any parent, a legal guardian, a legal custodian, or primary caretaker who works or volunteers in a health facility or who reasonably believes that they may otherwise be exposed to Covid-19 may designate a standby guardian by means of a written designation."

Pursuant to the above order, parents and kin may designate, in a writing that is witnessed by two persons, guardian powers to someone of their choosing, when they are working or volunteering in a medical facility or have reason to believe they've been exposed to Covid-19.
