



# Memo in Support of Using the Word "Kinship" in Federal Legislation

This Memorandum is authored by the New York State Kinship Navigator and is supported by the New York State KinCare Coalition in order to support the use of the word "kinship" as the term of art in policy and law and to avoid the use of the word "grandfamilies."

Many federal, state, and local laws and regulations use the term "kin" or "kinship" or "kinship care" or "kincare" to reference the over 2.7 million children living with kin, *i.e.*, grandparents, relatives, and family friends who are raising children in the absence of their parents. In New York, as well as around the country, research and state databases show that about 65% of all kinship care families are grandparents raising grandchildren. This percentage is confirmed by the Federal Interagency Forum on Child and Family Statistics. *America's Children: Key National Indicators of Well-Being, 2017*, as well as by federal and state Temporary Assistance to Needy Families data. The percentage has fallen over the last decade due to the expansion of state and federal regulations that consider other relatives and family friends as valuable placement resources for children.

An enormous amount of sources, including organizations, laws and regulations, research papers, websites, programs, published guide books, and promotional materials use the term kinship. In 2019, Ohio provided \$8 million for a kinship navigator and adoptions program, the most state funding in the nation; the program is called OhioKAN for Ohio Kinship and Adoption Navigator, see <a href="https://search.yahoo.com/search?fr=mcafee&type=E211US1079G0&p=ohiokan">https://search.yahoo.com/search?fr=mcafee&type=E211US1079G0&p=ohiokan</a>. In comparison, there are relatively few programs, literally no laws or regulations, and only a handful of organizations, research and policy papers that use the word "grandfamilies." Despite the current and past usage of "kinship" as the term of art for federal legislation, in 2019 Congressional legislators introduced the "The Grandfamilies Act" and the "Help Grandfamilies Prevent Child Abuse Act." Despite the fact that since 2015, the U. S. Senate has issued three proclamation declring September as "Kinship Care Month." **The effort to codify grandfamilies as a term of art will cause enormous problems for the nation's efforts to support kinship families, and we urge legislators to consider avoiding commitment to this term.** 

The consequences are real, complicated, and far reaching. Federal funding streams dedicated to kinship navigators and other kinship services will need to incorporate references to the other term. Statutory and regulatory pronouncements will need to be clarified. Programs will need to revise their titles, websites, and guides. Federal and state policies, including manuals, advisories, and administrative directives will have to be revised or clarified to identify the new term.

The consequences go beyond revisions and clarification. Programs that are funded as kinship navigators and other programs using the term "kinship" in their outreach will be inconsistent with programs that derive from the "grandfamilies" legislation. The result is that caregivers may not recognize services that are available to them.

Kinship families, especially those caregivers who are not grandparents, may not view the term grandfamilies as referring to them. Grandparent caregivers who identify with the term "grandfamilies" conversely may not understand that the term "kinship" includes them.





Up until the introduction of these bills, there have been various organizations who have advocated for their favored term to be adopted as the universal term. However, the differences were essentially inconsequential. But with the potential codification of a new term, and its use by congress to present helpful information for kinship families, the unintended consequence is significant, it becomes a hindrance to the advancement of assistance for kinship families, leading away from establishing one consistent terminology.

Most of the literature, and certainly The Children's Bureau, already assumes that kinship is the accepted term of art. With limited opportunity to survey nationally the use of the two terms, Appendix A offers examples of the use of kin and/or kinship; Appendix B offers examples of Child Welfare League of America publications and conferences use of kinship care; Appendix C offers examples of the use of grandfamilies.

Finally, associating the prefix "grand" with the word "families" to describe all non-parent (kin) families is inappropriate because it implies that the experience is enjoyable. While caregivers love their children, they care for them because of parental neglect, abuse, abandonment, drug use and other unfortunate circumstances. The families are torn asunder with tragedy and children are often traumatized. It is not grand.

For the above reasons, the word "kinship" should be preferred over the word "grandfamilies." The introduction of a new term is an unnecessary policy and practice complication with enormous implications and it should not be codified as a term of art.

# **Appendix A: Samples of Kinship Usage**

### Federal Laws that use "Kinship" (Asterisk References Kinship)

- 1994 when Congress passed, which introduced the concept of Waivers for certain requirements of titles IV-B and IV-E of the Social Security Act, Public Law 103–432 (1994): including subsidized guardianship: <a href="https://www.acf.hhs.gov/sites/default/files/cb/subsidized\_0.pdf">https://www.acf.hhs.gov/sites/default/files/cb/subsidized\_0.pdf</a>
- 2. The Adoptions and Safe Families Act (1997) required a report to Congress on kinship care. The 2000 final report defined public and private kinship care and made recommendations for reforms to kinship foster care.\*
- 3. National Family Caregiver Support Act (2000) does not use the term kin but provides discretionary funding for older grandparents and "relative caregivers" who are caring for children.
- 4. The Fostering Connections to Success and Increasing Adoptions Act (2008) provisions for kinship guardianship and kinship navigator demonstration projects.\*
- 5. *Preventing Sex Trafficking and Strengthening Families Act (2017)* refunds Kinship Navigators demonstration projects.\*
- 6. The Families First Prevention Services Act (2018) provides Title IV-E funding for kinship navigator services.\*
- 7. **Ombudsman Appropriation Act (2018)** \$20,000,000 for kinship navigator pilot in each state (funded approved for second year and possibly third year).\*
- 8. Omnibus Consolidated Appropriations Act (2018): Omnibus Consolidated Appropriations page 955





(\$20,000,000 for kinship navigators); refunded for second year, and possibly third year.\*

9. Supporting Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Act (2018) creates federal Agency Advisory Council.\*
